Another group of volunteers has been working with our event planner to make The Green Flash a huge success. Plans are in place for the November 5th event at our beach and sponsorships are being sought. The proposed boardwalk has now been approved and we can begin to raise funds for the project. The Green Flash this year will be a major kick-off fund raiser for the boardwalk so we will need the support of all our members in this endeavor. While we will need some volunteers to work at the event, we need more of you to attend and bring others along with you.

Summer months allow time in the early hours for hammers, saws, nails, and concrete work and we thank those volunteers who tirelessly maintain the boardwalks and bath houses and who keep the native growth at bay.

Looking forward to the season's activities and events, we have a field trip planned in October to Shark Valley in Everglades National Park. More details to follow from Phil Nye. The Green Flash is November 5th. Our resident artist, Erv Krauss, will hold an art show December 3rd in the pavilion and January 14th is the annual Wildlife and Wildlands Art Show, involving many artists.

While the Board and many volunteers work very hard to accomplish the goals of the organization, additional participation is needed and new ideas and input are welcomed. The Friends of Delnor-Wiggins Pass State Park have a luncheon every May but this year's May 9th luncheon was very special. We decided to honor our founders, those folks who had the foresight to establish a volunteer organization back in 1987. The Founders' Day Luncheon honorees included those members who signed the charter and named our organization Supporters of Del Nor Wiggins Park, Inc. Two of the original five signers of the charter where able to attend - Ludwig Erb and Rosemary Miktuk. Present at the luncheon and also honored for their work in those early years of the Supporters were Joan Erb, Edie Sadowski, Dorothy Atzingen, and Art and Kay Peley.

Mark Nicoletti, assistant park manager welcomed the 50 or so members and guests. Brittany Smith, park ranger, wrote and read a clever poem about her love of the park and her appreciation of the Friends for the work they do. Carolyn Shaw, park specialist and volunteer coordinator presented awards to the members for hours contributed during the year. Rosemary Miktuk spoke about why they saw a need to organize a volunteer group in 1987 to help the park staff to maintain the park. Rosemary said that we were the seventh in the state to be organized as a CSO- Citizen Support Organization.

We were honored to have at our luncheon the daughter of Lester and Dellora Norris, Lavern Norris Gaynor. Mrs. Gaynor spoke to the members about how her mother convinced her father to put up the money so Collier County could purchase the park and save it from development. On April 24, 1964 acquisition of the park was made possible when her parents arranged the purchase of the land through their St. Charles, Illinois charities. In 1988 the CSO honored the Norris family by placing a plaque near the beach and at that time Mrs. Gaynor praised the efforts of the CSO in raising funds for the park amenities not funded through the state. The current Friends group has now created a garden space around this plaque and given it the name Dellora's Garden. Mrs. Gaynor said her mother would be very pleased to have the garden named after her.

Also in attendance was former State Representative, Mary Ellen Hawkins, who shared remarks about the naming of the park as it changed from Delnor Park to Delnor Wiggins Pass State Recreation Area and Dr. Lois Bolin, co-founder of Naples Back Yard History. We are fortunate that Delnor-Wiggins Pass State Park has such history which is woven into the fabric of the history of our community.

Dellora's Garden

Now, back to the DGGEES. Two days after the luncheon, the DGGEES went to the Native Plant Store in Ft. Myers to buy vines for the arch, assorted ground cover, and additional plants to fill in the area around the bench and ADA pad. We purchased native plants appropriate for our State Park barrier island, Blue-eyed Grass, Spotted Beebalm or Horsemimt, Railroad Vine, Golden Creeper to name a few.

The crew consisting of Carolyn Shaw, Alicia Astorga, Ann Petrillo, and Marcia Byrd arrived back at the park in time for lunch. We decided to delay planting till Friday since the temperature was already in the 90's and we preferred *stayin'alive*. Returning to plant of May 13th were Alicia Astorga, Marcia Byrd, David Eastlake, Kaye Klug, Alliene Liden, Ann Petrillo, and two new members, the Hemonds, delivered by Millie Lucanegro.

After planting the garden on Friday we took a walk with Alliene and Alicia to picnic areas that need some work. One is clearning invasive kalanchoe plants in area #4 and the other is replanting an area north of parking lot #3 where many sea grapes had to be taken out. Alicia showed us the work that could be done there. After consultation with Bob Steiger and Carolyn Shaw, the DEEGEES will work on these areas over the summer. More information on this is coming.
