HURRICANE SEASON

Hurricane season is upon us again, lasting from June through November. We hear about it in the news, in TV commercials, in flyers available just about everywhere we go and look someone is telling us to be prepared. So we might as well spend a little time in this forum to have some more information and words to contemplate.

Through careful planning, we can be effectively organized for the possibility of yet another hurricane strike in our area. Despite the challenges we face in the event of one of these terrible events, some of the planning we can do for our family and ourselves can give us some peace of mind.

Let me start by asking the question, "Where are you gonna go?" No one can make 100% accurate predictions on the path of neither any storm nor its intensity when it hits. No one should hang out at the beach waiting for the storm to hit. We can start planning ahead on some of the possible locations where we might want to go to ride out the storm. Networking with family and friends within the State or in nearby states can give you some possibilities on where to stay. Doing some research on some inland hotels and keeping their phone numbers handy incase you need to start making reservations. Although we may not know for sure the path of the storm we can plan appropriately to ensure we have a few possible locations inland and to the north of here.

We also hear about making preparations to prevent damage to our homes. Here's another question "Have you cut back some of your trees?" Cutting back our trees will not only cut back on some of the hazards associated with wind damage, but it will stimulate new growth to give us fuller and more fruitful trees in the summer. New growth branches will also flex quit a bit more than the older branches that can readily break during high winds.

What about storm shutters? Has the maintenance been done to them? Lubrication, test operation, are all the parts there? We see it time and time again, in Haines City, Orlando, Tampa, New Orleans, and even here. Everyone trying to find everything they need hours before the storm. Many people say things like "It only happens once every 20 or 30 years." "We just had one last year it won't happen this year."

During the 2003-2004 hurricane seasons, I had just returned to Florida with my family, we were staying at my parents' house just outside Orlando while they were in New York. Charlie can buzzing through central Florida, then it was Francis, Ivan threatened us as it came through twice, and then there was another hurricane that came through. It seemed like every other week we had a storm. Hurricanes like bombs can land close enough to create damage and havoc to the same place.

How about 2004-2005 hurricane season, Dennis and Katrina came through the Gulf, although they didn't make landfall here in Southwest Florida they did create higher winds and seas along this coast and they sent most of us into action. The actions taken prepared us and may have saved some homeowners from extensive damage when Wilma hit.

Be prepared, know where to go, and don't wait till the last minute to leave.
