GOPHER TORTOISES RESEARCH TALK

Tuesday, Oct 7, 14, 21, & 28 at 9:30 AM All Ages, FREE with park entry fee

The Herpetology Research Lab at Florida Gulf Coast University is investigating a population of Gopher Tortoises within Delnor-Wiggins Pass State Park. Learn about this research from FGCU Environmental Studies students who will explain and demonstrate what is taking place. These weekly educational programs will raise awareness for Gopher Tortoise conservation and the importance of the parks system to wildlife and ecosystem conservation.

Come take a walk through the trees that help hold south Florida together! Learn about the different types of Mangrove trees and how they are vital to the health of our local ecosystem. The walk will take place in and around the mangroves so we recommend bringing shoes that can get wet, bug spray, water, sunscreen, and a towel.


NATIVE PLANT WALK

We had 191 volunteers come out for the event. They spent 3 hours picking up trash all over the park and beach. Some volunteers were even brave enough to go into the mangroves! Thank you to all the volunteers that helped to keep our park looking beautiful.

Fall is here and cooler weather is just around the corner! This is a great time of year to get outside and watch for birds and butterflies. Many migratory birds are making their way through South Florida as well as some of the migrating Monarch butterflies. Here are some great websites to help you get started:

- The <u>Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail</u> is a great source of information about birds and local trails.
- <u>Ebird.org</u> has a page with a map of bird hotspots from all over the world.
- <u>Ebutterfly.org</u> lets you share photos, submit your observations, and helps you find butterflies in your area.

Did you know that over 50 species of caterpillars can sting? Caterpillars, the larval forms of moths and butterflies, often have stinging fibers and hairs as a form of protection against predators. One example is the Puss caterpillar (larval form of the Southern Flannel moth). The Puss caterpillar is one of the most venomous caterpillars in the United States. A slight brush or sting from a caterpillar can be very painful but for most people not a serious injury. However, people with any allergy problems should pay careful attention to their reactions.
